





Vacation Bible School "Animals in God's Word"



Music & Movement • Children move and grove as they explore music with songs, dance, and instruments. The class includes free play, story time, and guided music instruction, with new themes explored each week. Music & Movement begins Monday, September 14, and runs for 15 weeks.

Readers, Authors, & Artists • Immerse your child in literature and early oral and written language experiences. Weekly themes will explore books, authors, and illustrators through discovery, music, play, and art. All activities will encourage students to become authors and illustrators of their own books, with a focus on nurturing a child's natural readiness for reading, writing, and creating. This class is for children who turn four by 1.1.16. Readers, Authors,



and Artists begins on Tuesday, September 15, from 9:00 A.M.—11:15 A.M. and runs for 14 weeks. Cost is \$190.

Great Pretenders • Let your child's imagination run free. This class uses drama, art, and creative games to enhance and expand great children's literature and Bible stories. Children will create story props, costumes, and puppets and then use them to retell stories. Children will explore new vocabulary, story structures, and build literacy skills. This class is for children who turn four by 1.1.16. The Great Pretenders begins Tuesday, September 15, from 12:45 P.M.—3:00 P.M. and runs for 14 sessions. Cost is \$190.

Come and Play • A great precursor to preschool! Children are provided a warm and safe Christian environment to play with other children and to practice spending some time away from parents or caregivers. They will hear Bible stories and other books, participate in art and music activities, and take time out to share a snack together. This class is for children who turn two by 6.1.15. Come & Play begins on Wednesday, September 9, from 9:15 A.M.—11:15 A.M OR 12:15 P.M.—2:15 P.M. and runs for 14 weeks. Cost is \$190.

Health Ministries



How can it possibly be August already? August is an interesting month as it doesn't have a special holiday. But there are some special Awareness Topics for August. My favorite is Family Fun month. What a great thing to focus on for the month of August! Most of my topics for the summer have been focused around play, both adults and children. Nothing could be healthier than fun with your family.

Another topic for August is Children's Eye Health and Safety. It is a very timely topic with school just around the corner. Some suggestions for keeping

your child's eyes healthy:

Use this month to discuss the importance of eye safety with your children. More than 12 million children suffer from vision impairment, and eye injuries are one of the leading causes of vision loss in children. There are an estimated

42,000 sports-related eye injuries each year, and the majority of them happen to children. Talk to your child's pediatrician if you suspect your child has any of the eye diseases below:

- Amblyopia (lazy eye)
- Strabismus (crossed eyes)
- Ptosis (drooping of the eyelid)
- Color deficiency (color blindness)
- Refractive errors (nearsightedness, farsightedness, and astigmatism)

Children should:

- Wear protective eyewear while participating in sports or recreational activities.
- Play with are age-appropriate toys. Avoid toys with sharp or protruding parts.

One of the best ways to ensure your child keeps his/her good vision throughout life is to set a good health example!

From Farm to the Table

Farmers' markets are a great place to find the freshest sweet corn; the reddest, ripest tomatoes; and the most fragrant, flavorful strawberries.

Good cooking starts with good ingredients. Make the most of your bumper crop with this recipe in which fresh vegetables play a starring role.

Herbed Sweet Corn and Tomato Salad

Ingredients

- 6 medium ears sweet corn, shucked
- 4 medium tomatoes, as ripe as possible
- 1/4 cup (or small handful) fresh mint leaves
- 1/4 cup (or small handful) fresh mixed herbs — like Italian parsley, basil, rosemary, sage
- 1 tablespoon olive oil
- Kosher salt and fresh black pepper, to taste
- 3 ounces soft goat cheese, chilled and crumbled

Directions

- Bring a large pot of water to boil over medium-high heat. Add the corn and boil for 5 minutes. Drain and let cool.
- Chop the tomatoes in quarters and scrape or squeeze out the juices and seeds. Chop the seeded tomato quarters into a rough dice. Pat dry with a paper towel to remove any extra moisture.
- When the corn has cooled, stand each ear up in a wide, shallow bowl and slice the corn kernels off with a chef's knife. Toss the corn with the tomatoes.
- Finely mince the mint and herb leaves and toss with the vegetables, along with the olive oil. Season to taste with salt and pepper, then crumble in the goat cheese and toss gently. Serve and enjoy!
