

New Director of Music & Worship

Dr. Frank Watkins will join the Trinity staff as director of Music and Worship on January 1, 2020. He has master of music degrees in piano performance and choral conducting and has earned his doctorate in Choral Conducting. Dr. Watkins is a professor of choral music education at UWEC. He also currently serves as the music director of the Eau Claire Chamber Orchestra and will be a guest lecturer at this summer's Village Harmony Music Camp in South Africa. Frank is accomplished in piano, organ and voice, and comes with years of experience with worship music of all forms. He will work closely with each aspect of our music ministry at Trinity to build upon our successes and lead us into new learning and growth.

Our congregation owes a great debt of gratitude for Interim Music and Worship Director Nick Drayton. He successfully ushered us through an extended time of transition in our music ministry. Nick brought stability and new ideas, and will conclude his interim responsibilities on December 31.

Dr. Watkins says: *"I am excited to join the Trinity Lutheran family as the Director of Music and Worship. For the past six years, I have served as organist and Director of Music at Peace Lutheran Church in Menomonie. Prior to my tenure at Peace, I served congregations in Florida, Mississippi, Illinois, Arkansas, and Nebraska. I believe my vast experience in worship, leadership, and experience are requisite skills that will serve to enhance the incredible worship at Trinity. I am excited to meet each of you and to join this wonderful community."*




Dear Trinity Members,

The clichés are flying through my brain as I seek inspiration for the first newsletter for 2020. What will this year hold for you and me. Sometimes I wish I had that crystal ball to see what lies ahead. Most of the time, I'm glad I don't.

I am officially retiring in February from my RN position at Mayo. (I am still going to be Parish Nurse here!) My heart pounds every time I think about it. I am not concerned about staying busy, but I am concerned about having purpose in my retirement. For 48 years I have been helping, comforting, and caring for people. Get Your Blood Pressure Checked

One in three American adults has high blood pressure. High blood pressure increases your risk for serious health problems including stroke and heart attack. Get your blood pressure checked regularly starting at age 18—and do your best to keep track of your blood pressure numbers. Trinity's Health Ministries offers free blood pressure screenings in the Parish Nurse's office on the second Sunday of every month.

The Trinity Book Club invites you to join them on Tuesday, January 21, in the Trinity Library at 6:30 P.M. to discuss *A Fall of Marigolds* by Susan Meissner.

September 1911. On Ellis Island in New York Harbor, nurse Clara Wood cannot face returning to Manhattan where the man she loved fell to his death in the Triangle Shirtwaist Fire. Then, while caring for a fevered immigrant whose own loss mirrors hers, she becomes intrigued by a name embroidered onto the scarf he carries...and finds herself caught in a dilemma that compels her to confront the truth about the assumptions she's made. What she learns could devastate her—or free her.

September 2011. A long-lost photograph appears in a national magazine, and widow Taryn Michaels is forced to relive the terrible day her husband died in the collapse of the World Trade Towers...the same day a stranger reached out and saved her. But a chance re-connection and a century-old scarf may open Taryn's eyes to the larger forces at work in her life.

Fiction

- *Us Against You* by Fredrik Backman. With immense compassion and insight, Backman reveals how loyalty, friendship, and kindness can carry a town through its most challenging days. (FIC BAC)
- *The Nest* by Cynthia D'Aprix Sweeney. This book is warm, funny, and acutely perceptive debut novel, about four adult siblings and the fate of the shared inheritance that has shaped their choices and their lives. (FIC SWE)
- *Magic Hour* by Kristin Hannah. Dr. Julia Cates was one of the country's preeminent child psychiatrists until a shocking tragedy ruined her career. She moves back to her small hometown in western Washington and meets a 6 year old child who inexplicably emerged from the nearby woods. This story is about Julia and her will to help this child to assimilate into the community and find her a home. (FIC HAN)

Non-fiction

- *The Library Book* by Susan Orlean. Orlean reopens the unsolved mystery of the most catastrophic library fire in American history and delivers a love letter to the institution of libraries themselves. (027.4 ORL)

Youth

- *Ghost Boys* by Jewell Parker Rhodes. After seventh-grader Jerome is shot by a white police officer, he observes the aftermath of his death and meets the ghosts of other fallen black boys including historical figure Emmett Till. (+ FIC RHO)
- *The Thing About Jellyfish* by Ali Benjamin. Twelve-year-old Suzy Swanson wades through her intense grief over the loss of her best friend by investigating the rare jellyfish she is convinced was responsible for her friend's death. (+ FIC BEN)

- *If There Never Was A You* by Amanda Rowe. This board book shares the message of love between parent and child. (++) FIC ROW)

- *Not-So-Lucky Lefty* by Megan McDonald. This book is from the Judy Moody and Friends series. Judy is a righty but her brother, Stink, and her dad are lefties and are going to celebrate Left Handers Day. - *It's Your First Day of School, Busy Bus!* By Jody Jensen Shaffer. Today is the very first day of school! *Busy Bus* is excited, but he also has some first-day jitters. Luckily, bus driver Ben knows just what to do to make sure that the school year gets off to a great start. (++) FIC SHA)
- *Look Up With Me: Neil deGrase Tyson* by Jennifer Berne. Follow young Neil's journey as he discovers the wonders of space, the thrill of science, and the joy in sharing the beauty of our amazing universe. (++) B TYS)

Inspired by true and historical blue people and the Kentucky Pack Horse Library Service, this book is a story of fierce strength and one woman's belief that books can carry us anywhere. Highly recommend—you won't be disappointed.

Why Reading Aloud to Kids Helps Them Thrive

Reading aloud to kids has clear cognitive benefits. For example, brain scans show that hearing stories strengthens the part of the brain associated with visual imagery, story comprehension, and word meaning. One study found that kindergarten children who were read to at least three times a week had a “significantly greater phonemic awareness than did children who were read to less often.” And the landmark *Becoming a Nation of Readers* report from 1985 concluded that “the single most important activity for building knowledge for their eventual success in reading is reading aloud to children.”

But reading also strengthens children's social, emotional, and character development. According to a recently published study, reading to very young children is linked to decreased levels of aggression, hyperactivity, and attention difficulties. The study's lead author shared this insight with *The New York Times*, “When parents read with their children more . . . they learn to use words to describe feelings that are otherwise difficult and this enables them to better control their behavior when they have challenging feelings like anger or sadness.”

If reading isn't part of your daily routine — or if you want to make it a more positive experience — here are three tips for making the most of read-aloud time:

- **Start early, read often.** Reading to babies helps build bonds, vocabulary, and habits.
- **Read the pictures.** Illustrations are visual clues that can help kids build their vocabulary and their emotional toolkit.
- **Press the pause button.** Some nights, it's tempting to rush through books on the way to “lights out.” But sometimes press the pause button before turning the page. Take time to look at a picture, ask a question, or share reactions.
