Dear Friends,

The calendar has now shifted to August, and with it comes a subtle shift in the lives of many. Fall sports teams begin to practice. Teachers prepare their classrooms. Vacation time is used.

An insightful thought from my daily devotional stated, “Although there is no progress without change, not all change is progress.”

The world around us continues to evolve and change. Change can usher in progress, renewal, or strength. On the other hand, change can be detrimental, damaging, and hinder growth. All factors considered, change is part of who we are as we grow, learn, mature, and live each day.

Amidst such changes within our society, how can the church respond with clarity and direction? Where is God amidst change within and around us?

The disciples struggled to understand what Christ taught, and what they saw, compared to what they had known from the past. These changes led to the question, “Teacher, what law is the greatest?” In essence, tell us what is foundational for lasting joy and stability.

Jesus responded, “Love the Lord your God with all your heart, mind, and strength. Love your neighbor as yourself.” (Matthew 22:36–40) The two greatest commands deal with relationships.

Brian Hathaway, noted Bible scholar, estimates that 44% of the New Testament deals with how people relate to each other. Key words that are used include: love, build up, serve, and teach.

As a church within an ever-changing society, the importance of relationships is essential for mission and faith development. Our Fresh Look congregation survey stated the following as a top priority for our congregation: **Develop ministry that nurtures relationships.**

As one of your pastors, I give thanks for the many relationships that are fostered within, and beyond, the walls of Trinity. Consider the following: worship; home visitation ministry; women’s circle meetings; Men of Integrity small group; Staying in Love couple’s ministry; Thursday morning text study; family camp; Montana Adventure trip; children’s summer day camps; international ministry in: Jamaica, Japan, Malawi, and Haiti; and Vacation Bible School (record: 376 children!).

Like the 12 disciples, we are encouraged to invite others into a relationship with God and with others in a community of faith. From the list above, and additional small group offerings on the horizon, I hope you seize an opportunity to nurture your faith with God, and with others, here at Trinity. By doing so, the joy of Christ is made new and our lives are uplifted to love and serve two lasting qualities needed in an ever-changing world!

New Worship Community

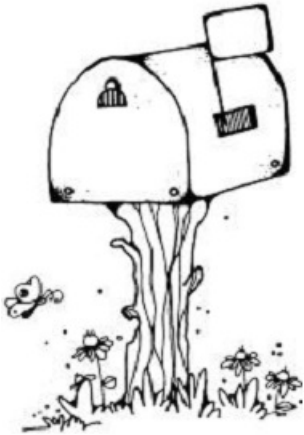

Health Tip: Protect Against Bug Bites

Insect bites can cause uncomfortable itching and may transmit diseases such as West Nile virus. The American Academy of Pediatrics offers these suggestions to help protect against bug bites:

- Avoid using products with fragrances including perfumes, hair sprays, and scented soaps.
- Keep away from areas that attract insects such as puddles or blooming flowers.
- Avoid clothing with flower prints and bright colors.
- Use an insect repellent that contains DEET (on children at least 2 months old), but avoid products that combine sunscreen and insect repellent.
- Choose insect repellents that contain 10 percent to 30 percent DEET or, as an alternative, Picaridin.
- Wash off insect repellent when you or your children come back inside.

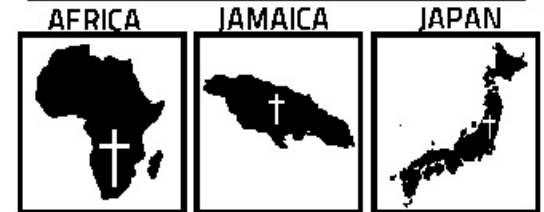

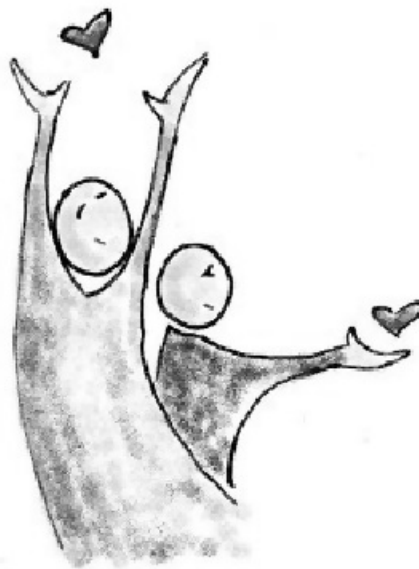
Mission Jamaica is about Friendships

Bob and Mary Schoenknecht have been an instrumental part of Mission Jamaica for many years.

From the very beginning, one of the most rewarding aspects of our mission trips to Kingston, Jamaica is the good friends we make there. Each year as we return, we warmly renew our connection with old friends and welcome new friends as well. This past spring we spent our last day touring the Mavis Banks Coffee Factory in the Blue Mountains just outside of Kingston. On the way back, I asked if we could visit Hope Valley Experimental School where we had worked during our first two mission trips. We chose Hope Valley for our first trips because we had a number of teachers in our group who wanted to visit classrooms in Jamaica. We also had a number of young people who we thought might like to connect with other Jamaican children. The school site was a good choice because we had seventy-five people in our first group and forty in our second group.

One of the friends that we made at Hope Valley was Patrick. Patrick lived in the Mona Rehabilitation Center which is located right next to the school. Patrick had birth defects caused by thalidomide. He was born missing the lower portions of both legs, and he had only two fingers on each hand. Despite his limitations, Patrick could do many things and was a great help to us during our stay. His preferred mode of transportation was a skate board which he handled with perfection from a sitting position. As we approached the school for our visit this year, I thought immediately of Patrick. We had not seen him in almost ten years, and I wondered if he was still around. When we got to the gate of the school, there was Patrick ready to let us in. He was riding in his new electric wheel chair. We were so excited to get reacquainted again. We warmly welcomed each other as if no time had passed. I noticed that his skate board was still tucked in the back pocket of the wheel chair.

When people ask me what I get out of going on this mission trip, I tell them the most important things are the friendships. Jesus tells us that we are to love our neighbors. I invite you to consider coming with us next time and meet some of our Jamaican neighbors. I think you will find that you, too, will want to go again and again to visit those good friends that you make there. —Pastor Bob Schoenknecht



Beacon House

With the incredible volunteer efforts of over 20 area faith based organizations, the Beacon House in downtown Eau Claire provides emergency shelter, meals, and hospitality to families and single pregnant women for up to 30 days. In 2010, 57 families received shelter including 101 children. 90% of these families left the Beacon house with stable housing. 72% left with stable employment. Trinity is proud to be a supporter of the Beacon House. Four times a year we serve by providing meals and acting as hosts to the guests. It's a wonderful, rewarding opportunity to serve those in need in our community. Our next serving opportunity is the week of September 18. Creating Spiritual Identity

How parents help teach kids to see themselves as children of God!

Kids identify themselves in a variety of ways. Young children learn to see themselves as sons or daughters, brothers or sisters. Through their daily activities, older children view themselves in additional ways: students, athletes, musicians, the list goes on.

Growing up with an overarching sense of belonging to God is a vital way for kids to define themselves. Helping them tap into their identities as children of God is something parents can nurture.

"Parents are apostles, priests and bishops for their kids," said Pat Eidsness, a lay mission developer and associate in ministry at Westside Lutheran Church, Sioux Falls, S.D. "What happens at home literally doubles the chances that kids will grow up connected to a church and seeing God in their lives."

Parents help ground their children with a stronger spiritual identity when they:

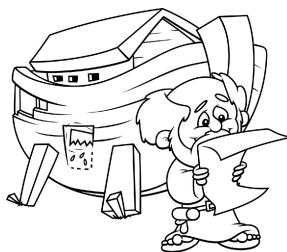
- **Talk about God's Presence** • Share the day's highs and lows with each other, perhaps at a meal or at the end of the evening, and talk about ways that God was part of those experiences. "Informal conversations like these help children develop a sense of watchfulness for God's fingerprints in their daily lives," said Eidsness, former director of the South Dakota Synod's "Faith Family Style" program. "When we start paying attention, we start to see that God's presence is with us everywhere," she said.
- **Show and Tell** • Collect and display items that tie to your family's faith, such as a grandparent's confirmation certificate or a candle from your child's baptism. Talk about these items and what they represent in your family's ongoing journey of faith. Stories like these can help anchor children in their family's faith heritage and spur a stronger sense of spiritual identity.
- **Document It** • Start a faith scrapbook for your child, and encourage them to add to it as they grow. Include pages for special Sunday school drawings, pictures of your child at volunteer projects or church events, and other memories that highlight your child's faith formation. Over the years, children can look back on these pages and remember God's work in their lives.

Keep Summertime Pastimes Safe by Preventing Gasoline Burn Injuries

Tips for Parents • Parents can keep summertime pastimes, like grilling and building campfires, safe for their kids this season by following the simple guidelines below. The consequences of gasoline burn injuries can be severe and lifelong. They are also preventable.

Tips for parents in the safe handling of gasoline:

- Never use gas to start a fire. Parents who mix gas and fire put themselves—and anyone near them—at risk of injury or death. Kids also learn by example.
- Talk to your kids about gasoline. Teenager Austin Bailiff nearly died in a gas fire. Share his video with your child at www.StopGasFires.org.
- Keep gas out of reach of children. Out of sight isn't enough, for any age. Store your gasoline where children cannot access it. Many parents keep their gas in a locked location.
- Use a proper container. Never use old soda bottles or other makeshift containers to store gas; someone might think it's a beverage and drink it. And even a small cup of gasoline can emit vapors and may ignite.
- Store gasoline in a well-ventilated area outside your vehicle and living space. Consider a detached garage or outdoor storage shed.
- Keep gas away from any source of heat, spark or flame. Even common household appliances like water heaters and clothes dryers can ignite gas vapors.
- Read the warning label on your gas can. A list of safety precautions is imprinted on every approved portable gasoline container. Make sure you read the warnings if you store gasoline at home.
- Visit StopGasFires.org for more information and to help spread the word to other parents.

StopGasFires.org is a program of the National Gasoline Safety Project, which is sponsored by the Portable Fuel Container Manufacturers Association in partnership with Shriners Hospitals for Children and Safe Kids USA. An estimated 1,500 children are injured or killed in gasoline fires each year. Overall, approximately 14,500 people die every year from burn injuries and burn-related infections.

Greek Salad

- 1 head romaine lettuce- rinsed, dried, and chopped
- 1 red onion, thinly sliced
- 1 (6 ounce) can pitted black olives
- 1 green bell pepper, chopped
- 1 red bell pepper, chopped
- 2 large tomatoes, chopped
- 1 cucumber, sliced
- 1 cup crumbled feta cheese
- 6 tablespoons olive oil
- 1 teaspoon dried oregano
- 1 lemon, juiced
- ground black pepper to taste

DIRECTIONS

1. In a large salad bowl, combine the Romaine, onion, olives, bell peppers, tomatoes, cucumber, and cheese.
2. Whisk together the olive oil, oregano, lemon juice, and black pepper. Pour dressing over salad; toss and serve.
