Reconciled in Christ Action at February 2 Annual Meeting

The Annual Meeting of Trinity is this Sunday, February 2, at 10:40 A.M. in the Worship Center. Please come. The order of business will include reports from 2013, the 2014 proposed budget, and elections for the Trinity Council, Endowment Trust Fund Board, and Personnel Committee.

In addition, a resolution from the Council's Reconciled in Christ Task Force will come before this meeting. Since its inception last spring, the task force has invited the congregation to numerous listening sessions, educational forums, and Bible studies to consider becoming a R.I.C congregation and making a public affirmation of welcome to LGBT people. If it is the will of the majority at the meeting to approve a Reconciled in Christ designation and affirmation of welcome, then our church would publicly welcome your children, siblings, and friends who are gay or lesbian and often feel excluded or scorned.

The Council in January approved the resolution after finding a clear consensus among Trinity members in favor of an Affirmation of Welcome and R.IC. designation.



"Always Being Made New"

Dear Friends,

"Always Being Made New" is the celebratory phrase marking the 25th anniversary of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America. It is a statement that speaks of growth, formation, and an underlying openness to such realities, all made possible by God.

The ELCA has been, and continues to be, made new. New ventures included the ordination of women, faith partnerships with other denominations, expansion of disaster response ministries throughout the world, huge steps forward in combating malaria in Africa, and affirming ministries for our brothers and sisters who are homosexual. I am proud of our denomination!

"Always Being Made New" is also the theme for my upcoming sabbatical. I served as solo pastor for 2.5 years in Balsam Lake, and this month marks my seventh anniversary with this fine congregation of Trinity. In Trinity's personnel policy, pastors are eligible for sabbaticals after completing six years of ministry. It reads, "A sabbatical leave is understood as an integral and important part of an overall strategy for enhancing the mission of the congregation through pastoral renewal, development and growth."

My sabbatical will extend from April 1–June 1, and its framework is divided into three sections:

- Something that directly benefits the congregation: I will be volunteering for two weeks (Monday–Friday) at Reach, Inc. here in Eau Claire. I'll be working, interviewing, and learning from their staff, employees, and employee's family members. From this experience, I will develop a ministry plan for individuals with a developmental disability. This has been a great interest of mine since my days in seminary.
- Exploring an area of interest: Reading has always been an interest of mine. Yet, like many of you, time to do so isn't always possible. I have a reading list of five books that I will read while away. As a father with three young children, this will be a unique venture.
- Relaxation: Time with my family will be a primary focus for my time away. We have planned a week-long trip to Disney World which has left our children ecstatic! This will be their first time on a plane, so it'll be an experience.

Finally, thank you to this congregation for having a sabbatical policy that seeks to nurture and support its pastors. Thank you to our Church Council for supporting this sabbatical; and thank you to Pastor Kurt, Pastor Sarah, and Pastor Brahm for their additional ministry efforts while I am away. I am truly blessed by many as I seek to grow in new ways within pastoral ministry.

Add ICE to your Cell Phone

Emergency medical personnel are being trained to check your cell phone for an "In Case of Emergency" (ICE) contact. This contact allows them to reach your family members or other designated emergency contacts in the event you are unconscious or unable to respond to them. Some phones come with a contact labeled ICE which allows you to attach one or more of your phone contacts to the ICE label. Others allow a spot to add medications, allergies to medications, and medical conditions/surgeries. If your phone does not have a pre-designated ICE contact, create one by adding a contact labeled ICE or, for more than one, "ICE–Dad" or "ICE–John."

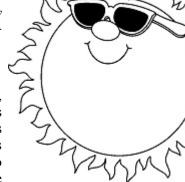

Bundle up

Choosing clothes and layering them properly are keys to keeping comfortable while exercising outdoors, especially in cold temperatures. Adding or removing layers as needed will help you to stay warm and dry while staying active.

Base Layer: This layer, closest to your skin, should wick moisture away from your body and into the air or outer layer where it can evaporate. The best base layer materials are synthetics (polypropylene and polyester). These materials are lightweight, too. Skin chafing can be a concern, so check the base layer design features. Stretchy fabric allows you to move easily. Seamless or flat-seam clothing lies flat and won't rub your skin.

Mid-Layer: This insulating layer helps to take moisture away from the base layer. Wool and synthetics, such as fleece, work well. This layer should be snug but not constricting. Features such as full-length front zippers allow for venting.

Outer Layer: This layer protects you from the elements. When it's dry outside, go for a lightweight soft shell that provides warmth, breathability, and wind resistance. If the conditions are wet, make sure your outer layer is both breathable and waterproof. Source: American College of Sports Medicine

Student Fundraising "Trip" Accounts

All students in grades 7–12 at Trinity have the opportunity to fundraise for their own Trip Account. Japan Missionary: Handbells as Mission Work?

They're expensive. They're heavy. They require a lot of "tender loving care" and time for caretaking. And, as one student said, "When I watched the students play, it looked so easy, but when "I" tried it, I couldn't make one nice note. They are more challenging than I thought." All that being said, why in the world would a small college like ours try to instigate a program that requires so much to be successful?

When we created the Handbell Team here at Kyushu Lutheran College, part of the rationale was both to enhance the worship experience for students and faculty, as well as to provide an additional opportunity for students to tangibly engage in worship. My role as their teacher was born not out of my own handbell experience (since I had none!).

With a large portion of students coming from non-Christian backgrounds, it is difficult to explain to them that when they perform at a service, the goal is not to be seeking applause. A wonderful performance is a blessed outcome, but not the main purpose. Their job, I tell them, is to offer whatever they have done in terms of musical preparation as an offering of thanks to God.

Part of the teaching I do is to explain the text behind the melodies and harmonies, and contextualize it as the bones of the music. Additionally, exploring reasons for the hymns being written are often mini-testimonies in and of themselves, as they are so often written as a response to the composers' own personal experiences and faith.
