## Turn the Your Clocks Back!

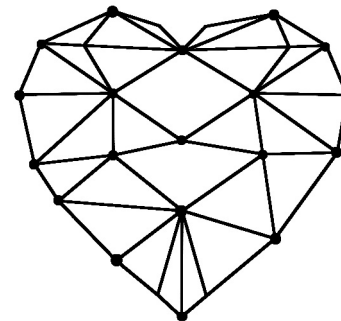

## Book Recommendation

—from Bob Schoenknecht

*The Many Daughters of Afong Moy* By Jamie Ford

The *Many Daughters of Afong Moy* is one of the more unique novels I have read in a while. It is part historical fiction, part modern-day, and part science fiction.

In 1834, the real-life Afong Moy was the first known Chinese woman to immigrate to America. She spent approximately 17 years traveling across the United States performing under the name the "Chinese Lady." Patrons were curious about her bound feet, clothing, the songs she sang, and her unique make-up. Author Jamie Ford uses Afong as inspiration for this novel about transgenerational epigenetic inheritance. Afong's female descendants have inherited the trauma that Afong endured, and each "daughter" has added some of their own traumas to the next generation.

The primary character is Dorothy Moy, who lives in Seattle, Washington in 2045. Dorothy's ongoing bouts of depression have caused her to lose her teaching position as well as the title of Washington's poet laureate. When she notices her daughter, Annabelle, exhibiting some of the same behaviors Dorothy did as a child, she undergoes a new radical treatment to help her deal with her inherited trauma. In so doing, Dorothy is able to interact with Faye Moy, a nurse in China serving with the Flying Tigers in 1942; her own mother, Greta Moy, a tech executive who created a dating app in 2014; Zoe Moy, a student who is enamored by one of her teachers in 1927 England; Lai King Moy, a girl who barely escapes San Francisco during a plague in 1892; and Afong Moy, the Chinese Lady who started it all. Dorothy realizes that each woman has a great love that is somehow denied, and they all struggle with acceptance in a foreign land. In dealing with these past events Dorothy hopes to find the peace that has evaded the Moy women for generations.

Jamie Ford describes this novel as his big box of crayons. He said, "I wanted to use all of my colors to draw a story... and create a word picture with as much wonder as possible." As in his previous novels, I was drawn in right from the beginning by Ford's masterful storytelling and I wholeheartedly recommend you check it out.



## Book Club

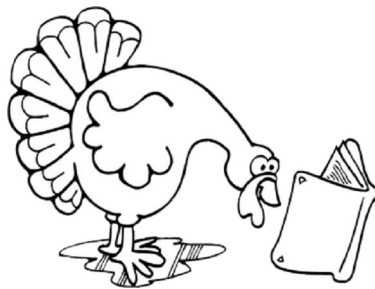
On Tuesday, November 15, at 6:30 P.M. in the lobby, the group will discuss *The Fountains of Silence* by Ruta Sepetys. Under the fascist dictatorship of General Francisco Franco, Spain is hiding a dark secret. Among them is eighteen-year-old Daniel Matheson, the son of a Texas oil tycoon, who arrives in Madrid with his parents hoping to connect with the country of his mother's birth through the lens of his camera. Photography-and fate-introduce him to Ana, whose family's interweaving obstacles reveal the lingering grasp of the Spanish Civil War-as well as chilling definitions of fortune and fear. Daniel's photographs leave him with uncomfortable questions amidst shadows of danger. He is backed into a corner of decisions to protect those he loves. Lives and hearts collide, revealing an incredibly dark side to the sunny Spanish city. Have a feast with our bountiful books! Stop by Trinity's Library and check some out.

### Fiction

- *The Water Knife* by Paolo Bacigalupi. In this climate fiction novel, author Paolo Bacigalupi warns us of what may happen if we continue to neglect the forthcoming water scarcity—if we continue to allow the condition of Lake Mead and the overall American Southwest persist. Readers of science fiction thrillers will enjoy this book. (FIC BAC)
- *Migrations* by Charlotte McConaghy. Epic and intimate, heartbreaking and galvanizing, Charlotte McConaghy's *Migrations* is an ode to a disappearing world and a breathtaking page-turner about the possibility of hope against all odds. (FIC MCC)
- *The Overstory* by Richard Powers. *The Overstory*, winner of the 2019 Pulitzer Prize in Fiction, is a sweeping, impassioned work of activism and resistance. Author Ann Patchett says, "The best novel ever written about trees, and really just one of the best novels, period." (FIC POW)
- *The Displacements* by Bruce Holsinger. A timely novel about a well-to-do family living in Miami and becoming displaced by a category six hurricane that upends everything they have taken for granted. This suspenseful read explores what happens when privilege is lost, and resilience is tested in a swiftly changing world. (FIC HOL)
- *Bewilderment* by Richard Powers. With its soaring descriptions of the natural world, its tantalizing vision of life beyond, and its account of a father and son's ferocious love, *Bewilderment* marks Richard Powers's most intimate and moving novel. At its heart lies the question: how can we tell our children the truth about this beautiful, imperiled planet? (FIC POW)



### Youth Fiction

- *Willodeen* by Katherine Applegate. Eleven-year-old Willodeen adores creatures of all kinds, but her favorites are the most unlovable beasts in the land: strange beasts known as "screechers" the villagers of Perchance call them pests, even monsters, but Willodeen believes the animals serve a vital

role in the complicated web of nature. (+ FIC APP)

- *Hoot* by Carl Hiaasen. Roy, who is new to his small Florida community, becomes involved in another boy's attempt to save a colony of burrowing owls from a proposed construction site. (+ FIC HIA)
- *Truly Tyler* by Terri Libenson. This graphic novel for middle school readers is a story about being your truest self and trusting your true friends. (+ FIC LIB)
- *Becoming Brianna* by Terri Libenson. Another graphic novel for middle school readers *Becoming Brianna* is an endearing, relatable story of friendship and finding confidence. (+ FIC LIB)

### Picture Books

- *Bluey for Real Life: A Story Collection* by Penguin Young Readers. Four Books in one! Readers will love this collection of Bluey's greatest adventures, plus fun facts about everyone's favorite characters. (++) FIC PEN)
- *Woodland Dance!* by Sandra Boynton. Destined to be a read-aloud favorite, *Woodland Dance* is a mystical, waltzing story from beloved author and illustrator Sandra Boynton. A lovely, lyrical way to end, or start, the day. (++) FIC BOY)
- *Goodnight Great Outdoors* by Lucas Alberg. A perfect bedtime story, whether you are under a roof or under the stars. This gentle, calming story celebrates the great outdoors by saying goodnight to nature. (++) FIC ALB)

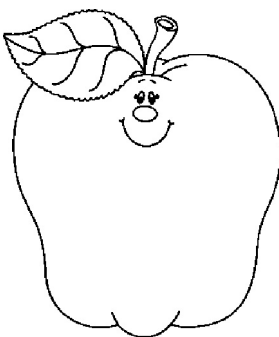

## From the Parish Nurse

November: The month of gratitude. And feeling gratitude makes us happier!

Gratitude is a thankful appreciation for what an individual receives, whether tangible or intangible. With gratitude, people acknowledge the goodness in their lives. In the process, people usually recognize that the source of that goodness lies at least partially outside themselves. As a result, being grateful also helps people connect to something larger than themselves as individuals—whether to other people, nature, or a higher power. "Gracious God, thank you!"

In psychology research, gratitude is strongly and consistently associated with greater happiness. Gratitude helps people feel more positive emotions, relish good experiences, improve their health, deal with adversity, and build strong relationships.

People feel and express gratitude in multiple ways. They can apply it to the past (retrieving positive memories and being thankful for elements of childhood or past blessings), the present (not taking good fortune for granted as it comes), and the future (maintaining a hopeful and optimistic attitude). Regardless of the inherent or current level of someone's gratitude, it's a quality that individuals can successfully cultivate.

## Friend, I See You This Thanksgiving

Dear friend whose partner left this earth this year, but whose family demands that traditions continue, traditions like turkey and pie and smiling and getting out of bed, I see you wanting to shout, "Doesn't 'tradition' mean doing things the way they've been done before? Well, that will be impossible. Things cannot be the same. The most important person in my life is gone." I hear that shout, even as you stifle it for the crowd, while you eat turkey and pie and smile and get out of bed. Because, "that's what we do on Thanksgiving!" Friend, I see you.

Dear friend whose partner's health is declining, who knows that the week ahead will bring procedures, hospitalization, unknown outcomes. Who, today, clings to turkey and pie and smiling and getting out of bed, because if today lasts forever, then perhaps tomorrow will not come. Who squeezes every ounce of goodness out of this day of festivity, because this is what people who don't have hospitalization looming do. They eat turkey and pie and smile and get out of bed. Tomorrow's schedule will look nothing like that of the general public, which means that today you do everything you can to be as normal as possible. Friend, I see you.

Dear friend whose partner is in the hospital, who will wrap up a plate of turkey and pie and carry it through the abandoned lobby of the hospital, past the darkened coffee shop, through the quiet halls, knowing full well that the quiet here means that at homes around the area people are with their families, gathered around tables, eating turkey that is warm and pie that is fresh. These people have the option of taking a day off from this hospital, but not you. Your beloved is here, and therefore, so are you, paper plate in hand, with turkey and pie. And before you enter the room you'll put on a smile, happy to see your love, but wishing it wasn't here. Friend, I see you.

Dear friend who has spent the last twenty months doing everything you can to keep your person safe from Covid, who is stepping out of your comfort zone this Thanksgiving to be with more people than you have since

the beginning, who wants to push for protocols and ask about testing, but won't, hoping that later you won't be kicking yourself, knowing those awkward exchanges could have made a difference.

Dear friend whose beloved partner, child, friend, parent is missing today, YES, I'm sure there are things in your life for which to be thankful AND you get to say, today, and any other day you want: THIS IS TERRIBLE. I MISS MY PERSON. NOTHING IS THE SAME WITHOUT THEM. If, today, or any day, it feels good and helpful to look for and list those things that are positive, please do.

And know that today, in the storm of "I'm thankful for..." posts, tweets, and greeting cards, you can say, think, feel, know, that THIS IS TERRIBLE. I MISS MY PERSON. NOTHING IS THE SAME WITHOUT THEM. Friend, I see you and we miss them too.

Dear friends who have hard things, I see you today. I see you getting out of bed, smiling, and eating turkey and pie. I see you thinking about who sat in that chair last year at this time. I see you watching your beloved with concern about what will happen between now and next Thanksgiving, wondering if this will be the last. I see you being asked how things are, and giving answers that only scratch the surface, so that this doesn't go down as the Thanksgiving that you cried in your potatoes and made things awkward. I see you using all of your energy to smile, make small talk, act as if all is well. I see you excusing yourself to the bathroom when a comment is made that for reasons no one but you would understand, unleashes emotions that you're trying so hard to keep zipped up for the day.

I see you. I love you. I know that all that hangs out in your negative space may not be welcome or comfortable at your Thanksgiving table today, but know that today, and always, it is safe here with me.
