Blessing for Healing



Quilting Items Needed


- New or gently used flat sheets (twin through king sized for quilt backs) colored ones are preferred. (Thrift sales are a good source for these or when cleaning your own closets.)
- Large or small cotton or cotton/poly fabric pieces that can be cut into squares that are at least $10 \frac{1}{2}$ " x $10 \frac{1}{2}$ " square and will be sewn into quilt tops.
- Money to purchase batting. Each roll costs over \$130 and is used to complete 20–25 quilts.
- Regular sewing thread in full or partially used spools of quantity color.

Northwest Synod Book Discussion

The Synod is hosting a ZOOM book discussion on Tuesday, April 11, from 7:00 P.M.–8:30 P.M. followed up with a discussion with the author on April Monday, 17. You can register by going to tinyurl.com/b79txvvj.

The book is *Unsettling Truths: The Ongoing*, Dehumanizing Legacy of the Doctrine of Discovery by Mark Charles and Soong-Chan Rah. Injustice has plagued American society for centuries. And we cannot move toward being a more just nation without understanding the root causes that have shaped our culture and institutions. In this prophetic blend of history, theology, and cultural commentary, Mark Charles and Soong-Chan Rah reveal the far-reaching, damaging effects of the "Doctrine of Discovery." In the fifteenth century, official church edicts gave Christian explorers the right to claim territories they "discovered." This was institutionalized as an implicit national framework that justifies American triumphalism, white supremacy, and ongoing injustices. The result is that the dominant culture idealizes a history of discovery, opportunity, expansion, and equality, while minority communities have been traumatized by colonization, slavery, segregation, and dehumanization. Healing begins when deeply entrenched beliefs are unsettled. Charles and Rah aim to recover a common memory and shared understanding of where we have been and where we are going. As other nations have instituted truth and reconciliation commissions, so do the authors call our nation and churches to a truth-telling that will expose past injustices and open the door to conciliation and true community.

SPARE by Prince Harry, Duke of Sussex (B PRI) Book Recommendation

SPARE is a memoir by Prince Harry, Duke of Sussex. The book is written in three parts. It starts out with his years growing up, including the death of his mother, Diana; secondly, his military years with time spent fighting in Afghanistan; and thirdly, meeting and marrying Meghan Markle. It gives the reader a window into the life of a British royal which is a real eye opener. This is Prince Harry's personal story and it's a mixture of love, sadness, and tragedy, but also some very funny parts. I highly recommend it—truthfully, I couldn't put it down.

New Books in our Library

 account of Shakespeare's son, Hamnet, who died at age 11 in 1596 from
 the bubonic plague. Roughly four years later, his father writes the play
 Hamlet, interchangeable at the time with name Hamnet. (FIC OFA)
- Jack by Marilyn Robinson. Jack tells the story of John Ames Boughton, the beloved, erratic and grieved-over prodigal son of a Presbyterian minister in Gilead, Iowa. In segregated St. Louis sometime after World War II, Jack falls in love with Della Miles, an African American high school teacher who is also the daughter of a preacher. Their fraught, beautiful romance is one of Robinson's greatest achievements. (FIC ROB)
- Nine Liars by Maureen Johnson. Stevie Bell is taking her detecting skills abroad when she becomes embroiled in a mystery from 1990s England. Someone's lying about what happened in the woodshed—seven suspects, two murders, one killer still playing a deadly game. (YP FIC JOH)
- The Nazi Conspiracy by Brad Meltzer and Josh Mensch. From the bestselling authors, Brad Meltzer and Josh Mensch, comes the little-known true story of a Nazi plot to kill FDR, Joseph Stalin, and Winston Churchill at the heights of World War II.




Communion Celebration

Care & Concern

Caregivers and Depression ...

...it is not surprising that many family caregivers experience depression. As a caregiver, you are in a very difficult position. The sympathy of friends and the concern of healthcare providers are focused on your loved one—while no one is paying much attention to how you may be affected by the very upsetting changes that have occurred in your life.



As time goes on you may begin to feel lonely and unappreciated. These feelings, coupled with the knowledge that your caregiving duties might well last a lifetime, set you up as a prime target for depression.

Not all caregivers get depressed, but many do. As many as 72% of caregivers of loved ones report feelings of depression. Caregivers who provide care 36 or more hours a week are more likely than non-caregivers to experience symptoms of depression or anxiety. For those caring for a parent, the rate of depression is twice as high; and for spouses the rate is six times higher.

The most important question to ask is: what can you do about depression once it has seemingly taken over your life?

Seeking help is the most important step, but it is not always easy. The symptoms of depression, such as lethargy and hopelessness, can rob you of your will to seek help. You may be embarrassed by what you believe is the stigma of depression, and simply deny that anything is wrong. Perhaps you've been blue for so long that you think it's normal to feel bad. These can all keep you from taking that important first step—getting help. The most important thing is to realize you need help and reach out to get it. There are resources available that can start you down the path to recovery and a happier life.

Wishing everyone a Blessed Easter filled with hope, grace, and gratitude!

Sunday, April 16 National Health Care Decisions Day

Have you completed an Advance Directive for your healthcare? If you are over the age of 18, you need an Advance Directive for Healthcare. The State of Wisconsin is NOT a "next of kin state." If you don't have an Advance Directive and you are in the hospital unable to speak for yourself, the court will appoint a guardian for you. It will cost your family around \$5,000 to become your decision maker. Our Parish Nurse has copies of Advance Directives from the State of Wisconsin as well as "Five Wishes Advance Directives" which are also legally accepted in Wisconsin.



Trinity's Friends of Flynn Committee

March Fund Appeal—Thank you to all who donated to the recent Friends of Flynn Fund Appeal—our goal this year is \$6,100. At the writing of this article, we do not have an update of funds received. Just a reminder, most of these funds, \$5,400 help support Flynn's food pantry and the weekend meal project through Feed My People. Another \$630 was sent to FMP for fresh food vouchers to be used at local Kwik Trips. Flynn's partnership coordinator now makes up the weekend meal bags from the food she orders for the pantry. She can also hand out these vouchers as needed so families can pick up bread, milk, eggs etc at their local Kwik Trip. If you haven't had an opportunity to give to this ministry, you are invited to do so now. Checks should be made out to Trinity Lutheran Church with a notation to Friends of Flynn.

Here are some of the ways that Friends of Flynn funds will be used for the remainder of this school year.

- Snacks—Snacks were recently supplied for an after-school program called Club Invention, for the 4th grade kindness program and for each classroom who have students that are unable to bring snacks from home. Snacks will also be purchased for the third and fourth grade classes during their testing days in April.
- Emergency Clothing—Jogger pants and athletic shoes are often requested.
- Books—A new book will be given to each child to keep at home. during the summer.
