Dear Trinity Members,

Every 4th of July, people around this country celebrate Independence Day as a reminder of when the colonies on the east coast, of what we now call the U.S.A., declared their Independence from the British empire. Often times this is marked with parades, cookouts, and fireworks. But today, I wonder what sort of freedom we are called to exercise. Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. said, "Our lives begin to end the day we become silent about things that matter.' And as declared by Theodore Roosevelt, "This country will not be a good place for any of us to live in unless we make it a good place for all of us to live in."

What are we freed for?

One of Martin Luther's earliest (and best-known) essays is "On the Freedom of a Christian." In it, Luther provides what has become a paradoxical, but lifegiving statement of discipleship: "A Christian is a perfectly free lord of all, subject to none. A Christian is a perfectly dutiful servant of all, subject to all." Luther was arguing against the


dominant thinking in the church of his day. Back then, people suggested that Christians are to climb the "spiritual ladder" to God by our own good works. It was the same battle that the apostle Paul fought with some of the other leaders of the early Christian church-certain rules and demands have to be met before someone can be considered Christian. No way, wrote Luther (echoing Paul). God has already done all the work. We are free from trying to earn our own righteousness.

But Luther made it clear that this freedom from works (or "the law") doesn't mean we can just do whatever we please. The freedom

Christ has given us has a purpose—we are freed for something. And that something, according to Luther, is service to our neighbor. God doesn't need our good works, but our neighbors do. Service, then, isn't a requirement for salvation but the natural result of our joy in knowing we are loved and forgiven.

We live in a global economy, a global community. Your neighbor may be halfway around the world. Your neighbor may have manufactured the clothes you're wearing or may be using a computer run by the software a relative developed. Your neighbor may have picked a papaya to eat for lunch in the same hour that he or she picked the papaya you're eating right now. Your neighbor may be making his or her way to you as a refugee from an environmental disaster caused in part by global warming, which results from pollution you contribute to. Your neighbor may be praying for you as you make your views known in a democratic nation. In each of these situations and others you are aware of or can imagine, what is your responsibility as a neighbor? Ministry in a global community can feel overwhelming if it means that we are, as Luther put it, to be Christ to one another. Our journey to serve a neighbor halfway around the globe can begin with a few steps to serve a stranger across the street.

What does it mean to meet someone's need? Christ took time to determine what someone really needed rather than automatically doing what seemed like the first step. First steps are important. When someone has not eaten in days, an immediate action is called for. Charity is



essential. but Christ's neighborliness called for justice. True neighbors are called to discover why the condition exists. This takes more time a n d intentionality. Moving from charity t o neighbor to

justice with neighbor can be difficult. It requires careful listening, changing old assumptions, and openness to walking with a neighbor in mutual ministry. That might be more akin to what freedom and independence looks like celebrating and striving for in 2023.



Book Review and Recommendation

---Windigo Island by William Kent Krueger

When the body of a teenage Ojibwe girl washes up on the shore of an island in Lake Superior, the residents of the nearby Bad Bluff reservation whisper that it was the work of a deadly mythical beast, the Windigo, or a vengeful spirit called Michi Peshu. Such stories have been told by the Ojibwe people for generations, but they don't explain how the girl and her friend, Mariah Arceneaux, disappeared a year ago. At the request of the Arceneaux family, private investigator Cork O'Connor takes on the case.

But on the Bad Bluff reservation near Bayfield, Wisconsin, nobody's talking. Still, Cork puts enough information together to find a possible trail. He learns that the old port city of Duluth is a modern-day center for sex trafficking of vulnerable women, many of whom are young Native Americans. As the investigation deepens, so does the danger. Yet Cork holds tight to his promise to find Mariah, an innocent fifteen-year-old girl whose family is desperate to get her back. With only the barest hope of saving her from men whose darkness rivals that of the legendary Windigo, Cork prepares for an epic battle that will determine whether it will be fear, or love, that truly conquers all.

This is the fourteenth book in the Cork O'Connor series. Cork is one-quarter Ojibwe and three-quarters Irish American, and through his eyes and those of Henry Meloux, we see Krueger's deep respect for Anishinaabe traditions and beliefs. In Windigo Island particularly, the difficulties of being a teenage Native American in white culture are portrayed: poverty, drug abuse, alcoholism, and prostitution—kids rejecting their own culture and being marginalized in the society away from "the rez." This is a story that sheds light on many issues that are happening right in our own backyard.

Care & Concern

From Parish Nurse

This month's AARP Bulletin carried a wealth of safety tips for the summer. Many are things that I am guilty of doing so thought I would share a few suggestions:

Wallet/Purse Audit: If you are like me, I have everything but the kitchen sink in my purse. Not a good idea. I know five people who in the past few months have had their wallets stolen out of their purse while shopping locally (especially grocery stores).

- Limit the amount of cash you carry to just the amount you need. Replenish as needed.
- Never carry a blank check! Rarely is a check needed to make a purchase these days.
- Only carry your Medicare card when you are going to an appointment that requires it. Medicare numbers can be used in a variety of scams if stolen.
- Choose one credit card and one debit card you wish to use the most. Leave the rest at home. Multiple credit cards are a goldmine for criminals.
- Remove your Social Security card. You do not need it for daily use and criminals can use it to open lines of credit.
- Do not carry a house key in your wallet. If your wallet is stolen criminals can find your address and quickly show up there.
- Clean out old receipts, business cards, rewards cards, etc.

How to Fall Safely!

One of the greatest fears for those of us of a certain age is falling and breaking a bone. Our instinctive reaction is not helpful. The main points are the following (think about this now, not when you are falling). Our natural reaction is to put our hands/arm out to break the fall. Don't do that.

- For all types of falls, bend your knees and aim the body part with the most padding (butt, outside of bottom thigh) as the first contact with the ground.
- Do not plant your arm down when landing. It will cause fractures.
- Roll with the fall, keeping your head tilted away from the ground.

Covid Vaccine Booster

Recommendations are that if you are age 65+ and/or have compromised immune systems, and your last booster was at least 4 months ago; you are eligible for a booster. Any adult who did NOT get a booster after the initial vaccine series would benefit from a booster. The government is also recommending to the vaccine makers that they make a vaccine for this fall that targets the more recent COVID variants. This is similar to how the influenza vaccine is produced each year.

Caregiver Tip Mind Your Own Mind-set

Acknowledge ALL your emotions, including fears, frustrations, and sadness. All those emotions are perfectly normal. Try to stay mindful, concentrating on what you are doing in any given moment rather than letting your mind wander to your ever-growing to-do list. Stay focused on the positives: Think about what you can accomplish instead of what you can't; celebrate what your loved one can do, rather than mourning what they can no longer participate in; appreciate the help you are receiving rather than resenting those who aren't supportive. Negative thinking activates your body's stress response.


