
Christmas Tree Disposal Fundraiser

Giving to Trinity

"...God loves a cheerful giver..." says 2 Corinthians 9:7. Just as you manage your household finances, Trinity must manage the church's finances as well. Our staff has done an outstanding job keeping our expenses well below our annual budget, but we can always use some help with additional income. If you'd like to make a gift to Trinity to help with our daily operating and maintenance expenses, use the "Give" button on our church website or contact our Business Manager, Dawn Paul, at the Trinity office (715.832.6601, Ext 214). Your gift will enhance our revenue stream and help us to balance our budget, including paying our expenses for things like heating and cooling of our building, electricity to power our lights, appliances, and devices, supporting our Noah's Ark pre-school and restocking our food pantry several days a week.

A particularly helpful way to give to a charity such as Trinity is through your assets in an Individual Retirement Account (IRA). If you are at least age 70 and a half, you can make a Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD) to Trinity. This is a tax-free donation made from your IRA and could be a win-win for you and Trinity. If you are currently taking Required Minimum Distributions (RDMs) from your IRA, your gift would also help you meet your annual RMD withdrawal requirement. Talk with your financial advisor or tax preparer to see how a QCD could benefit you and Trinity.

Another way to give is to remember Trinity in your will. A bequest to Trinity could bolster our finances and help you leave a legacy to your church. Discuss with your financial advisor and attorney to see if adding Trinity in your estate plan would be a wonderful way of leaving a lasting legacy.



Book Club

On Tuesday, January 16, at 6:30 P.M. in room 204, the group will discuss *Foster* by Claire Keegan. It is a hot summer in rural Ireland. A child is taken by her father to live with relatives on a farm, not knowing when or if she will be brought home again. In the Kinsellas' house, she finds an affection and warmth she has not known and slowly, in their care, begins to blossom. But there is something unspoken in this new household—where everything is so well tended to—and this summer must soon come to an end.



Warm Up With a Good Book! New Books

- The Mitford Affair by Marie Benedict. This explosive novel is of history's
 most notorious sisters, one of whom will have to choose: her country or
 her family. Between the World Wars, the six Mitford sisters dominated
 the English political, literary, and social scenes. As the Nazis rose to
 power some of the seemingly sensible sisters were swept up into radical
 action. Benedict does not disappoint in this historical fiction. (FIC BEN)
- Canary Girls by Jennifer Chiaverini. This historical fiction is about the "munitionettes" who built bombs in Britain's arsenals during World War I, risking their lives for the war effort and discovering camaraderie and courage on the soccer pitch. (FIC CHI)
- Windigo Moon by Robert Downes. This novel of Native America is the story of the great love of Blue Heron and Red Bear sustain an Ojibwa clan as it struggles to survive war, famine, and the coming of foreign explorers bearing deadly diseases. (FIC DOW)
- Born of Lakes and Plains by Anne F. Hyde. Historian Anne F. Hyde writes a revealing history of the West about Native peoples and the mixed families they made with European settlers. She follows five families whose lives intertwine major events: the extension of American power into the West; the ravages of imported disease; the violence of Indian removal; encroaching American settlement; and the mix of opportunity and disaster in post-Civil War reservations and allotment. Here is an indelible western history with a new human face. (978.02 HYD)
- *Tending Roses* by Lisa Wingate. Tending Roses is a rich story of family and friends and the bonds of family and the power of second chances. (FIC WIN)
- Their Eyes Were Watching God by Zora Neale Hurston. Zora Neale Hurston's beloved 1937 classic is an enduring Southern love story sparkling with wit, beauty, and heartful wisdom. It is told in the voice of Janie Crawford, who refuses to live in sorrow, bitterness, fear, or foolish romantic dreams. This literary wonder remains as relevant and affecting today as when it was first published. (FIC HUR)

- *Surrender* by Bono. Episodic and irreverent, introspective and illuminating, *Surrender* is Bono's life story organized around forty U2 songs. He was born Paul David Hewson in Dublin, Ireland and has been headlining stadiums with U2 for four decades. (B BON)
- Dear Jacob by Patty Wetterling and Joy Baker. With stunning detail, Patty Wetterling shares the untold story of the twenty-seven-year search for her son Jacob and its astonishing conclusion. (B WET)
- Democracy Awakening by Heather Cox Richardson. Many books have told us what has happened over the past number of years. Democracy Awakening explains how we got to this perilous point, what our history really tells us about ourselves, and what the future of democracy can be a narrative from historian and author of the daily newsletter Letters from an American. (320.4 GRA)
- Sea Prayer by Khaled Hosseini. From the author of *The Kite Runner*, comes this beautifully illustrated prayer of a father to his son as they wait for a boat to come to take them on a search of a new home. The father speaks of the long summer of his childhood, recalling his grandfather's house in Syria. He remembers the bustling city of Homs with its crowded streets and mosque days before the bombs came and they had to flee. (FIC HOS)

Books for Young People

- Prairie Lotus by Linda Sue Park. Summary: In Dakota Territory in the 1800s, part-Asian Hanna and her white father face racism and resistance to change as they try to make a home for themselves. Note, book recommendation by Ann Nelson, (+ FIC PAR)
- Native People of Wisconsin by Loew, Patty.
 An essential title for the social studies classroom, Native People of Wisconsin fills the need for accurate and authentic teaching materials about Wisconsin's Indian Nations. Readers will learn about the unique cultural traditions, tribal history, and life today for each nation. (+ 977.5 (LOE)

- Postcards from Summer by Cynthia Platt. Seventeen-year-old Lexi
 travels to her late mother's majestic summertime home to learn of the
 romance, and the tragedy, that changed her life forever. (YP FIC PLA)
- Everyone's Thinking It by Aleema Omotoni. Mean Girls meets Dear White People in this big-hearted, sharp-witted UK boarding school story about family, friendship, and belonging—with a compelling mystery at its heart. (YP FIC OMO)

Picture Books for Young Children

- The Wish Tree by Kyo Maclear. When you go searching for a wish tree you don't need a map or a compass or anything but a wish and a good friend. Author Kyo Maclear and illustrator Chris Turnham have created a gem of a book that will inspire wishers everywhere. (++ FIC MAC)
- *The Snow Globe* Family by Jane O'Connor. Summary: Two families, one a tiny one that lives in a snow globe in a larger family's home, anxiously await a big snowstorm. (++ FIC OCO)
- Ten Ways to Hear Snow by Cathy Camper. A snowy day, a trip to Grandma's, time spent cooking with one another, and space to pause and discover the world around you come together in this perfect book for reading and sharing on a cozy winter day. (++ FIC CAM)
- A World Full of Winter Stories by Angela McAllister. Fifty folk tales and legends from around the world are collected and retold by Angela McAllister, with enchanting illustrations by Olga Baumert. This is an anthology to be read when the weather turns colder, and the nights draw in. (++ FIC MCA)
- Young Mozart by Rachel Isadora. Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart learned to write music before he could write words. By the age of five, he had taught himself to play the violin. By the time Mozart was seven, he could compose music while he played it, and by the age of twenty-one, after touring for many years through Europe, he had completed almost three hundred works. In this biography, Mozart's life is recounted by artist Rachel Isadora. (++ B ISA)



Those ideas are not just for the Christmas season. We can focus on each of those every day of the year. So, no resolutions for weight loss or increased exercise. Remember each day that you are enough, you don't need to pursue perfection. Our brokenness and imperfections make



us uniquely who we are. And taking care of ourselves (5 minutes of prayer/meditation, breathing, yoga, etc.) is a necessary part of each day.


Quarterly Devotions Available
