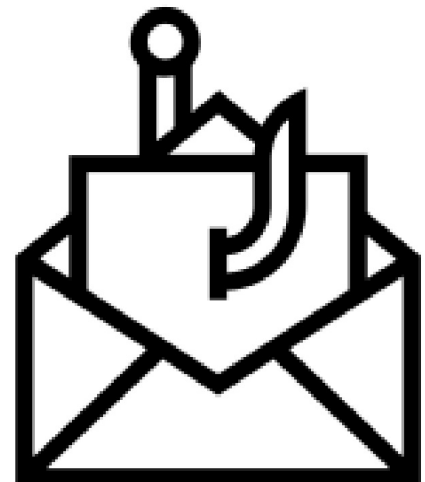
## What is "Phishing"

These email phishing scams rely on impersonation and social engineering tactics to engage with victims to ask them to purchase gift cards. The attackers leverage authority and urgency in their requests and will frequently impersonate high-level executives, Deans, or Chairs of departments (*or pastors*) as part of the scam. After a few exchanges the person asks you to purchase gift cards and send them the activation codes.

These attacks work because they are a simple, quick way to get money from their targeted victims, especially when the email is impersonating someone in the organization.

What should you do?

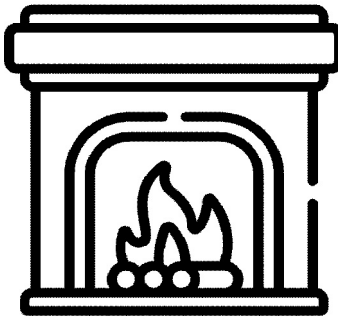
- Inspect the sender's email address to confirm it's actually coming from that person. Scammers will often send the email from a random email account and change the Display Name of the email address to either your boss, supervisor, or director.
- If you get an email from a colleague asking if you "are available?" or asking for you to only "text them," before responding, reach out to the sender in a separate email or call them to check if they actually sent the request.
- Don't reply to the email or use any contact information provided in the email—attackers often provide fake numbers or email addresses that they control.

### Events

- The results are in...our Spice Drive this year did not meet its goal of 700 spices, however, we were able to collect 365 spices that we are currently distributing to our guests. Thank you!
- We hope you all found your Reverse Lent Calendars in your Lenten mailing. Watch for sales and pick up an extra item or two for our pantry, every donation helps our budget! Let's see if we can exceed last years donations of 348 pounds.
- We distributed over 150 Valentine treat bags to our guests. A thank-you to Felicity Gunderson, a student from South Middle School who made us cards with attached treats we included with our bags. She is a member of National Juniors Honors Society and chose us as her service project.

### Community

It's important that we (Trinity Family) continue to spread the word and promote our Food Pantry. By doing this we can benefit from donations and support from our community. Please help us in thanking these community partners. Here are some examples of our community support:

- We were able to help out Princeton Valley Golf course after they had broken pipes that caused extensive flooding and required them to close for an extended time. To avoid destroying all of their fresh food items, they donated over 300 pounds of useable items that we were able to distribute to our guests. Thanks to Vicki Dueringer, Bill Engle, Terri Krause, Peggy Munden, Lynda Meyer, Pam Halgrimson for their assistance to help make this happen.
- Our Redeemer Church hosted a food drive and donated 167 pounds of food.
- The Memorial High School Honor Society team worked two evening pantries in February.
- We received a donation from Ramone's Ice Cream Parlor in the amount of \$500. This donation was raised by their team members Cash for a Cause program in 2023.

### Activity/Financial

- We have continued to see an increase in the number of guests served. In January we served 732 families, this is up 13% from last January.
- In January, our expenses were \$6,771.98, with income of only \$5626. Our current dedicated account balance is \$59,463.52 with current spending averaging \$1,630 per week. We will continue to monitor this and adjust spending as needed.

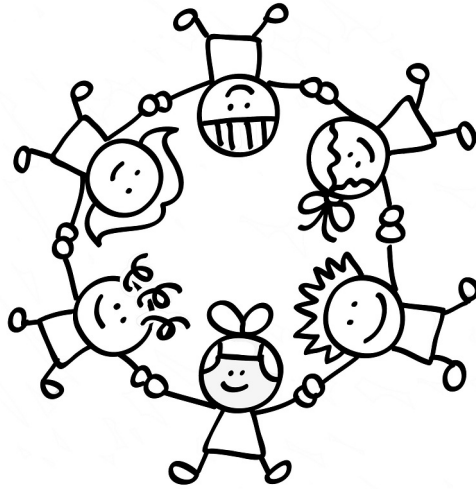

## Book Club

On Tuesday, March 19, at 6:30 P.M. in room 204, the group will discuss *Remarkably Bright Creatures* by Shelby Van Pelt.

After Tova Sullivan's husband died, she began working the night shift at the Sowell Bay Aquarium, mopping floors and tidying up. Keeping busy has always helped her cope, which she's been doing since her eighteen-year-old son, Erik, mysteriously vanished on a boat in Puget Sound over thirty years ago.

Tova becomes acquainted with curmudgeonly Marcellus, a giant Pacific octopus living at the aquarium. Marcellus knows more than anyone can imagine but wouldn't dream of lifting one of his eight arms for his human captors—until he forms a remarkable friendship with Tova.

Ever the detective, Marcellus deduces what happened the night Tova's son disappeared. And now Marcellus must use every trick his old invertebrate body can muster to unearth the truth for her before it's too late.

## What's New in the Library

### New Books

- *A Grandmother Begins the Story* by Michelle Potter. This novel is a story of the unrivaled desire for healing and the power of familial bonds across five generations of Metis women and the land bison that surround them. (FIC POT)
- *Of Time and Turtles* by Sy Montgomery. Compassionate and deeply researched, warm and astonishing, this book is an invitation to slip into turtle time— not the tick-tock hurry of human hustle, but the sacred, eternal time of daylight, darkness, and seasons. It's a story that shows us a way to mend a world beset with unprecedented perils, shell by shattered shell. (597.92 MON)
- *Here on Lake Hallie* by Patti See. This is a compilation of essays from local author and Leader Telegram columnist, Patti See. She writes about the comedy and beauty of life's everyday moments. (977.5 SEE)

- *Romney: A Reckoning* by McKay Coppins. Based on dozens of interviews with Romney, his family, and his inner circle, as well as hundreds of pages of his personal journals and private emails, this in-depth portrait by journalist McKay Coppins show a public servant authentically wrestling with the choices he has made throughout his career. In lively, revelatory detail, the book traces Romney's early life and rise through the ranks of a fast-transforming Republican Party. (B COP)
- *How to Be a Good Creature* by Sy Montgomery. This memoir reflects on the personalities and quirks of thirteen animals, Sy's friends, and the truths revealed by their grace. It also explores vast themes: the otherness and sameness of people and animals; the various ways we learn to love and become empathetic; how we find or passion; how we create our families; coping with loss and despair; gratitude; forgiveness; and how to be a good creature in the world. - *The Heaven & Earth Grocery Store* by James McBride. This novel is a tale that urges us to be better, do better, and open our eyes to missed connections. (FIC MCB) Note: Want to know more? Read Bob Schoenkecht's book recommendation for this month.

### Books for Youth

- *Diary of a Wimpy Kid: No Brainer* by Jeff Kinney. No Brainer is the 18<sup>th</sup> book in this best-selling graphic novel series and is the sequel to Diper Overlode. (+ FIC KIN)
- *The Black Stallion* by Walter Farley. First published in 1941, Walter Farley's best-selling novel for young readers is the triumphant tale of a boy and a wild horse. (+ FIC FAR)
- *The World Famous Nine* by Ben Guterson. In this mystery, Zander is determined to do whatever it takes to save his grandmother's nineteen-story out-of-this-world department store. It is a mystery book with a fantastic setting, full of surprises and danger, and coded messages to be solved. (+ FIC GUT)



### Picture Books

- *Knight Owl* by Christopher Denise. Summary: After achieving his dream of becoming a knight, a small owl protects the castle from a hungry dragon. (++) FIC DEN)
- *Keepunumuk* by Daniel Greendeer. A Thanksgiving Story: Wampanoag children listen as their grandmother tells them the story about how Weeachumun (the wise Corn) asked local Native Americans to show the newcomers how to grow food to yield a good harvest - Keepunumuk - in 1621. (++) FIC GRE)
- *Powwow Day* by Traci Sorell. In this story young readers will learn about the rites and traditions of a Powwow. Because she has been very ill and weak, River cannot join in the dancing at this year's tribal powwow. She can only watch from the sidelines as her sisters and cousins dance the celebration but as the drum beats, she finds the faith to believe that she will recover and dance again. (++) FIC SOR)
- *We Are Grateful (Otsaliheliga)* by Traci Sorell. Debut author Traci Sorell, a citizen of the Cherokee Nation, invites readers to journey through the year with a Cherokee family and their tribal nation as they express thanks for celebrations big and small. (++) 970.004 SOR)

## Book Recommendation

*The Heaven & Earth Grocery Store* by James McBride

In 1972, when workers in Pottstown, Pennsylvania, were digging the foundations for a new development, they find a skeleton at the bottom of a well. Who the skeleton was and how it got there were two of the long-held secrets kept by the residents of Chicken Hill, the dilapidated neighborhood where immigrant Jews and African Americans lived side by side and shared ambitions and sorrows. Chicken Hill was where Moshe and Chona Ludlow lived when Moshe integrated his theater and where Chona ran the *Heaven & Earth Grocery Store*. When the state came looking for a deaf boy to institutionalize him, it was Chona and Nate Timblin, the black janitor at Moshe's theater and the unofficial leader of the Black community on Chicken Hill, who worked together to keep the boy safe.

When I began reading this book, I had known nothing of Pottstown, Pennsylvania, with its Jewish immigrant families in the late twenties and early thirties and its African Americans who had moved to the northern states from the south. I learned about tallits, jook joints and the prevalence of dance halls for entertainment during that era prior to the Second World War. I got an in-depth look into the way people lived and engaged each other in the struggling neighborhood of Chicken Hill. I learned about the informal segregation of class, religious culture and race in small-town Pennsylvania and the ominous presence of the Ku Klux Klan and its annual march that was pretty much tolerated by all.

I enjoyed meeting the various primary characters—the caring Chona, owner of the *Heaven and Earth Grocery Store*, her husband, Moshe, the silent Nate, his loving wife, Addie, the mysterious Bernice, and the deaf boy, Dodo. They were colorful, soulful people, whose lives enriched the community of Chicken Hill.

*The Heaven and Earth Grocery Store* gives many beautiful life lessons that ultimately fill your heart with love, hope, and possibilities. This wonderfully woven tale with its' hardworking, clever characters is a thrilling multicultural, multigenerational, journey that will be hard to put down once you start reading.
